"Rob is gifted when it comes to working with wood," Sheila said.

Working off and on for the better part of a month, Rob came up with a new mounting block that is steady and sturdy.

The additional height makes it easier for riders to mount a horse and the broader width makes it safer for instructors and volunteers.

"Because of the larger surface area we're able to put ourselves in a better position," Sheila said.

Sure, there was some horsing around at Equine-Assisted Therapies summer camp this year...

But there was also a lot of learning going on as well.

"This was a great summer camp," said Lesson Coordinator Kasey Higgins, who ran the three weekly sessions. "Everyone had a good time and all of our campers got to experience a lot of TLC."

This year's camp included horse-related activities in the morning and then a lot of fun time, with activities such as arts, crafts, and games after lunch.

"The afternoon was all about having fun," Kasey said.

Morning activities were also a lot of fun and provided each student with an hour of riding, an hour of ground work such as grooming and an hour of learning more about horses.
