## Get Ready for a Fun Sunday Afternoon at the Race Track

On February 26, EATSF supporters will have a chance to be part of A Day at the Races, a fun-filled event at Gulfstream Park that will include lots of horse racing, great food and a chance to place bets, with Hall-of-Fame jockey Jerry Bailey sharing some wagering advice.

"Our A Day at the Races will be a chance for everyone to have fun, learn a little about horse racing

from Jerry Bailey, meet new people and support a wonderful cause all at the same time," said Anne Vegso, board chair for Equine-Assisted Therapies.

The Sunday event will begin at 11:30 a.m., with guests being escorted to the Ten Palms Room on the

second floor of the grandstands. The air-conditioned room features floor-to-ceiling glass windows and offers what Anne says is "an amazing view" of the track.

Guests will receive a complimentary glass of wine and access to a well-stocked

buffet that will be available throughout most of the afternoon. "Gulfstream is known for its

fabulous buffet," Anne said.

The event will also feature a drawing for VIP tickets to the Florida Derby on April 1 at Gulfstream Park. The race is considered an important leg on the road to the Triple Crown.

Jerry Bailey, who began a career as a broadcaster for ESPN

and later NBC following his retirement from racing, will be available to help guests better understand the sport and handicap races, including a special Equine-Assisted Therapies of South Florida race.

Jerry and Suzee Bailey are long-time

friends of Anne and Peter Vegso, with Jerry Bailey having been the jockey on several of the thoroughbred horses owned and raced by the Vegsos.

"Suzee and Jerry are both very special people," Anne Vegso said.

Few people know Equine-Assisted Therapies as well as Molly Murphy.

A former student who began riding when she was just seven years old, Molly also worked at the barn in a variety of staff positions before she headed back to college to get a master's degree in public administration with a non-profit management certificate from the University of South Florida.

When it came time for the board of directors to choose a new executive director, the decision to bring back Molly was an easy one.

"Molly's been doing an outstanding job since taking the reins late last year," said board chair Anne Vegso. "She brings with her a passion for working with the special-needs community as well as a thorough knowledge of our program. Her strong educational background and her understanding of larger issues facing those with special needs will help guide our program forward."

Diagnosed as a child with spastic cerebral palsy, Molly spent more than a decade as a student in the therapeutic riding program.

"I am aware of obstacles to individuals in the special-needs community," she said. "What my master's degree did was allow me to see strategies and solutions to those barriers."

With a focus right now on bringing stability to Equine-Assisted Therapies and filling open positions with applicants who will be the right match, Molly also has a strong long-term vision for the organization.

"I'm passionate about what we can do, not only for the organization but for the community at large," she said.

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# EATSF Receives \$2,000 Morgan Stanley Foundation Grant
